1. The public purpose and assumptions that underlie the creation of the license?

Long Term Care is one of the most highly regulated health care services in the United States. The Centers of Medicare and Medicaid continually modify and implement new regulatory requirements to manage care delivery to infirm individuals in our society. As such the complexity of providing care delivery services in compliance with substantial oversight while maintaining member centered care is challenging.

Regulations are necessary to ensure consistent quality outcomes for Nebraska's most vulnerable. As such the application of regulations can be up to the discretion of the inspection process. The Nursing Home Administrator Board allows oversight into the specific application or failure to provide the proper application of said regulations. This important committee works with Nursing Home Administrators and the Regulatory leadership to assure compliance with Federal and State of Nebraska regulations.

3. What the harm may be if the occupation is no longer licensed, certified, or regulated?
