- 1 A BILL FOR AN ACT relating to flags; to authorize the display of the
- 2 Honor and Remember Flag as prescribed.
- 3 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

- 1 Section 1. (1) The Honor and Remember Flag is hereby adopted as an
- 2 official symbol of the State of Nebraska representing the state's
- 3 commitment to honoring and remembering the lives of all members of the
- 4 armed forces of the United States who have lost their lives while serving
- 5 or as a result of their service.
- 6 (2) The Honor and Remember Flag's red field represents the blood
- 7 shed by brave men and women who have sacrificed their lives for freedom,
- 8 and the flag's white border recognizes the purity of that sacrifice. The
- 9 flag's blue star is a symbol of active service in military conflict that
- 10 dates back to World War I. The flag's gold star signifies the ultimate
- 11 <u>sacrifice of a warrior in active service who is not returning home and</u>
- 12 reflects the value of the life given. The folded flag element highlights
- 13 this nation's final tribute to a fallen service member and a family's
- 14 <u>sacrifice</u>. The flag's flame symbolizes the eternal spirit of the
- 15 <u>departed</u>.
- 16 (3) The Honor and Remember Flag may be displayed on any day,
- 17 including the following:
- 18 (a) Armed Forces Day, the third Saturday in May;
- 19 (b) Memorial Day, the last Monday in May;
- 20 (c) Gold Star Mother's Day, the last Sunday in September;
- 21 (d) Veterans Day, November 11; and
- 22 (e) Any other date on which a resident of this state dies while
- 23 serving on active duty in the armed forces of the United States.
- 24 (4) For purposes of this section, Honor and Remember Flag means a
- 25 flag as described in subsection (2) of this section that is recognized
- 26 <u>and accepted as commemorating and honoring the members of the armed</u>
- 27 forces of the United States who have lost their lives in the line of
- 28 <u>duty.</u>
