Summary of purpose and/or changes: LB 108 amends the eligibility provisions for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program [SNAP].	
There is a two-part income eligibility test under SNAP: first, gross income eligibility and second, net income eligibility. The current gross income eligibility limit in Nebraska is currently 130% of the federal poverty guidelines. When a family applies for SNAP, the first question is whether their gross income is at or below 130% of the federal poverty guidelines. If the family meets the gross income eligibility requirement, the next step is to look at net income eligibility. Families may make allowable deductions from their gross income in a few categories like housing and child care costs. To be eligible for SNAP, those deductions must bring a familys net income at or below 100% of the federal poverty guidelines for that family size. LB 108 would amend Neb. Rev. Stat. 68-1017.02 to set gross income eligibility at 185% of the federal poverty guidelines. The net income eligibility limit would not change. [Sec. 1, page 4, lines 23-28.]
