Summary of purpose and/or changes:

Section 1: Creates the Online Age Verification Liability Act.

Section 2: Defines the following terms: commercial entity, digitized identification card, distribute, internet utility, material harmful to minors, minor, news-gathering organization, publish, reasonable age verification method, substantial portion, and transactional data.

Section 3: Prohibits commercial entities from publishing or distributing material harmful to minors on a website unless it verifies the age of every individual attempting to access the material. Such entities are prohibited from retaining the



identifying information after access has been granted to the material.

Section 4: Allows for lawsuits against commercial entities that violate this Act. Allows for "appropriate relief" and damages.

Section 5: This Act does not apply to news-gathering organizations. An Internet utility does not violate this Act solely by providing internet connection.
