## Summary of purpose and/or changes:

Section 20 would amend § 69-2445 to make a concealed handgun permit optional for a person that is not otherwise prohibited from possessing a firearm.

Section 1 would replace the language in § 18-1703 to generally prohibit counties, cities, and villages from regulating firearms or requiring registration.

Section 2 would amend § 14-102 to remove the power of cities of the metropolitan class to punish and prevent the carrying of concealed weapons.

Section 3 would amend § 15-255 to remove the power of cities of the primary class to prohibit the carrying of concealed weapons.

Section 4 would amend § 16-227 to remove the power of cities of the first class to regulate, prevent, and punish the carrying of concealed weapons.

Section 5 would amend § 17-556 to remove the power of cities of the second class to regulate, prevent, and punish the carrying of concealed weapons.

Section 6 would amend § 28-101 to harmonize language.

Section 7 would amend § 28-1201 to provide definitions of "case―, "concealed handgun―, "minor―, "prohibited person―, "qualified law enforcement officer―, and "qualified retired law enforcement officer―.

Section 7 would define "minor― as a person under age 21 but would exclude a person age 18 or older in the armed forces or an authorized law enforcement officer. This is different from the general definition of "minor― under Nebraska law. The generally applicable age of majority in Nebraska is age 19.

Section 8 would amend § 28-1202 to change the existing criminal offense of carrying a concealed weapon. The amended offense would only apply to "minors― (as defined in Section 7) and prohibited persons. Possession of a firearm (concealed or otherwise) by a prohibited person is already a Class ID felony (mandatory minimum 3 years, maximum 50 years) under § 28-1206.

Section 9 would amend § 69-2441 and relocate the section to Chapter 28. This section provides a list of locations a person otherwise able to carry a concealed weapon is not allowed to carry a concealed weapon.

Section 10 would create a new section that replaces the prohibition on carrying a concealed weapon while under the influence of alcohol in § 69-2441. The prohibition is now a separate offense (Class III misdemeanor) in a separate section.

Section 11 would create a new section that requires a person carrying a concealed weapon to also carry an identification document. Violation of this section would be a Class III misdemeanor.

Section 12 would amend § 69-2440 and relocate the section to Chapter 28. This section requires a person carrying a concealed weapon to inform a peace officer or emergency services personnel that they are carrying a concealed handgun.

Section 13 would amend § 28-1351 to add the offenses in Sections 9-12 to the list of offenses that can support a charge of unlawful membership recruitment into a criminal organization.

Section 14 would amend § 69-2429 to harmonize the definition of "concealed― handgun and deletes the definition of "emergency services personnel―, which is relocated to the new section created in Section 11.

Section 15 would amend  $\hat{A}$ § 69-2435, Section 16 would amend  $\hat{A}$ § 69-2436, and Section 17  $\hat{A}$ § 69-2439 to make harmonizing changes with the changes made in Section 19.

Section 18 would amend § 69-2442 to include the criminal penalty (Class III misdemeanor) for failing to report the discharge of a concealed handgun.

Section 19 would amend § 69-2443 to delete the criminal penalties for offenses in other sections. The penalty provisions are relocated to the appropriate sections.

Section 21 is the repealer clause.
