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that wishes to can sign the resolution and if there are enough signatures it will denote the (inaudible) but no action is taken, is this right?

SPEAKER: Your question is what -

SENATOR KREMER: What happens to the resolution now?

SPEAKER: After the resolution is introduced?

SENATOR KREMER: Right.

SPEAKER: It's referred to the executive board, and then additional signatures may be added, the Chairs understanding that additional signatures may be added at any time, after that -

SENATOR KREMER: No vote is taken?

SPEAKER: Pardon me sir.

SENATOR KREMER: It is your understanding that no vote is taken by the body on the resolution at any time.

SPEAKER: Oh yes, I'm sorry, maybe I don't understand the question. Senator Luedtke.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President, Members of the Legislature, the rule says, the resolution will be read into the body, it will be left up there for five days for signatures, that is it, there is no vote on a regular -, except on the resolutions which are specified in that rule which are Changing the Constitution, and the other one is the one with regards to rules and regulations. All the rest of these type of resolutions that we have taken up here today are not of that variety unless the one that Senator Schmit had which I don't understand whether it is a rule and regulation or not, if it is then it would be handled under rules and regulations, but if not, it is the type where a memorial type thing, where you're saying do this or do that or don't do this or don't do that, we do not vote on it, we merely sign our names to the resolution, and if the resolution says send it to Washington, send it to the Governor, send it to the Mayor, whatever it says, we do, and it does not have to be engrossed.

SPEAKER: Thank you, Senator Kremer does that answer your question?

SENATOR KREMER: Yes sir, Mr. Chairman I will explain why I brought this up at this time. Thursday of last week, I introduced Resolution #3, and it's entered in the journal on page 70, this resolution if, has any impact or any type of effect it's going to have to be acted on today, either by the signature of an - pardon - well let me explain what the resolution does. I'll give you the background of a commission that's set up by the President of the United States, and that will probably explain better than I can -

SPEAKER: Senator Kremer. Would you do the Chair a favor and pull your microphone just a little closer to you sir. Thank you.

SENATOR KREMER: The National Water Commission was established by an act of Congress and approved by the President on September the 26th on 1968. The Commission is composed of 7 members appointed by the President and serving at his pleasure. With the Chairman designated by the President, the commissioners serve on a part time basis and so on, but here are the duties of this commission. The duties of the Commission are stated in one long sentence in the act and to para-phrase considerably
