SPEAKER: Ready for the consideration of bills on Select File. Senator Cavanaugh, is he in the chamber?

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 69 was considered yesterday. There are no committee amendments and the bill was laid over.

SPEAKER: We can't locate Senator Cavanaugh. Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I had the bill laid over. I see the Senator is here. I'd like to ask him a couple of questions.

SPEAKER: Senator Snyder, will you yield to a couple of questions.

SENATOR SNYDER: Yes.

SENATOR CARPENTER: When this bill was passed in its original form as I recall, at least some of us voted on the theory that once they were appointed, thereafter, they'd be elected as the bills passed provided. Now what is the reason and who wants to change it.

SENATOR SNYDER: I'm sorry, I'm having trouble hearing you. I think your question is why are we, then, wanting to be appointed rather than elected.

SENATOR CARPENTER: When the original bill was passed, we were told by the introducer then, as I recall, that we could be assured that if we passed this bill and the original members would be appointed as they would have to be in the first place, then from that time on they would be elected. Now, what has changed that situation.

SENATOR SNYDER: Well, I can answer that from a personal viewpoint better than I can from a viewpoint of the city administration, I believe. I think that in a metropolitan area you come upon any number of boards, commissions, et cetera. And this represents a--somewhat of a change in philosophy on my part. If you take a look of the ballots up there and if you go all the way from the weed control authority on up and I
