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This is one of the reasons why the purge system does not work, because as long as the person returns, a person can move out of his original precinct and can return to that original precinct to vote and as long as he returns to his original precinct it doesn't matter whether he lives there or not, the purge would never catch him. This is one of the fatal flaws of the purge. In answer to your question about what are we doing now, Senator Cavanaugh and I have a challenge procedure that would clear the records without penalizing persons for not voting. We have the thing worked out, the reason why we do not include it in this bill this year is that we want a chance to work this thing out in detail with the county clerk. We want to have them have a chance to go through it completely, to get a procedure that they are absolutely sure they can live with, so we've introduced 198 this year to eliminate the purge, to solve the problem facing Douglas county and those counties that have elections coming up and we will have a procedure in, a challenge procedure to apply to the whole state.

SPEAKER: Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: Well now, I did mention one thing that you didn't reply to, and that is the possibility of getting election commissioner in these counties that have a fairly density of population because the county clerk is just overwhelmed not with work just during the election season, but all during the year. Now you do have another bill don't you in regard to county officials salaries?

SENATOR ANDERSON: Yes, that is correct.

SENATOR DUIS: Now do you suppose there is any chance that you could amend this bill to include an office of the election commissioner or is there a bill in here to that effect?

SENATOR ANDERSON: I don't think there is another bill in that changes the requirements for election commissioners, I would be willing to sit down and work with you Senator Duis to see if there is some possibility considering this.

SENATOR DUIS: Thank you very much.

SPEAKER: The Chair next recognizes Senator Frank Lewis.

SENATOR LEWIS: Mr. Chairman and members of the legislature, I'd like to support the proposal of Senators Cavanaugh and Anderson, but I need to separate out the two issues, certainly there is problems to be handled in regard to challenge and I think it is commendable that they're looking at this as a long range operation, and saying let's get it done right and let's take the time to do it, but the immediate action required now, is to prevent the, or preclude people from voting in upcoming elections, so certainly I'll make this brief, but I think the concept is excellent and I rise to support the bill.

SPEAKER: A minute ago, was it Senator Fellman that asked to be recognized? I had a light go on back there and then you got it off before I got your name down. The Chair recognizes Senator Fellman.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Mr. President and members of the legislature, I rise to support this bill also. I think to do other is to defeat this bill, is to really get things back wards from where they belong. It seems to me that responsible people in political life should do everything possible to encourage as many people to vote as possible, and the way this law presently operates, does just the opposite. I'm not arguing that there aren't problems within the present system, but I think that our priorities would be totally reversed if we don't do what this bill calls for.
