

SPEAKER: Any further discussion of the motion? Question is shall the bill be withdrawn? All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote no. Senator Kime is asking to withdraw L.B. 421 and cancel the hearing. Have you all voted? Clerk will record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, no nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER: The motion is adopted and sustained and L.B. 421 is withdrawn and the hearing is canceled. Chair takes a great deal of pleasure in calling to the attention of the Legislature this morning that we have 17 eighth grade students here from McCool Junction. They are from Senator Epke's district. Their teachers are Karen Smith and Dan Jantzen. They are seated in the north balcony and we are delighted to have you here to observe the activities of the Nebraska Unicameral Legislature today. We want to compliment you in that it must have taken some effort to get in from McCool Junction this morning, too. I think that makes your trip perhaps even more meaningful. Welcome to the Nebraska Legislature. L.B. 112, Clerk will read.

CLERK: I understand, Mr. President, we have a request to lay the bill over until tomorrow, --

SPEAKER: Senator Marsh has requested to lay the bill over until tomorrow, is there any objection? If not, it is so ordered. That bill has now been laid over twice. That means that it will go to the bottom of general file. We will now proceed with the general file discussion of L.B. 243.

CLERK: Mr. President, there is a request to lay it over also.

SPEAKER: Thank you.

CLERK: Mr. President, a request to bracket L.B. 243 for ten days, signed Senator Warner.

SPEAKER: He has his motion up there. Are there objections to bracketing 243 for 10 days? Any objections? Hearing none, it so ordered, we'll bracket the bill for 10 days then. This moves us to the general file consideration of L.B. 13.

CLERK: Mr. President, L.B. 13 (read). There are neither committee amendments nor other amendments.

SPEAKER: Chair recognizes Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President and Members of the Legislature. This bill increases the number of special investigators from the present number by ten. It adds, it provides for a total then of twenty special investigators to the Highway Patrol's special drug investigator's division. The bill has been discussed
