CHAPLAIN: Prayer.

SPEAKER: Roll call. Please indicate your presence. Have you all indicated your presence? Clerk will record.

SPEAKER: Read the notices.

CLERK: Mr. President, (notices read.) That's all Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Very good, then we have one, two, three, four bills on final reading this morning. If we could begin to clear the floor and get the Senators in their seats why we will begin with the final reading of L.B. 138. Once again the Chair is calling attention to the fact that when on final reading no one can be seated besides the Senators. We must clear the floor. Senators must be in their seats. Okay, attention please, the final reading of L.B. 138. The Assistant Clerk will read the bill. Just a minute, Senator Richendifer for what purpose do you rise?
