

SENATOR PROUD: Referring to page 11 of the Rules it says, standing committees shall meet at 2:00 p.m., unless otherwise ordered by the Legislature. So I think that we, if we haven't already, we need a definite directive by the Legislature by unanimous consent or anything else to have these meetings at 1:00 p.m. I don't think that a committee chairman can just set a 1:00p.m. meeting unless he is ordered by the Legislature, that is what this rule says at the bottom of page 11.

PRESIDENT: Senator Duis has been in contact with the Chair, and we are instructed that this goes through the Reference Committee and if at that time, you ask for the 1:00 meeting, as it is referred by the Reference Committee, then apparently that clears it. Senator Duis, do you have further clarification? Senator Duis?

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, I was just going to ask them to look at the top of page 12, if they would, they would go just a little bit further and look at it and you will see that the Reference Commission or the Reference Committee would be the one that would change the date or the hour.

PRESIDENT: Now stand by. The Chair understands that some of this discussion is necessary and so as a relation to this particular bill, but we still have before this body the rule or the motion to suspend the rules for the introduction of this bill, and we have wondered considerably far away from that particular request. Now, Senator Nore, do you want to discuss that particular motion? Alright fine. Now, it was Senator Clark's original motion, Senator Clark, Senator Clark, do you care to close on your motion regarding the introduction of this bill? Alright, then the question is, "Shall the rules be suspended and the bill introduced?" All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote no. You are voting on the motion to suspend the rules of the introduction of the bill as explained by Senator Clark and Whitney. Senator Clark's motion, Senator Whitney's explanation. You are voting to suspend the rules, it does take 30 votes for the introduction of the bill. Thank you, the clerk will record.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 1 nay.

PRESIDENT: O.K. The rules are suspended, the bills introduced. The clerk will read the title.

CLERK: Now Mr. President

PRESIDENT: Do you want to read the title of the bill or

CLERK: Well we have got some more yet.

PRESIDENT: Alright, go ahead.

CLERK: Now Mr. President we do have a motion to suspend the rules and introduce the two attached bills from Miscellaneous Subjects Committee, signed Senator Carpenter. The first is request 838 signed by Senators Carpenter, Skarda, Waldron, Mahoney, and Fellman. A bill for an act relating to off-street parking district acts to provide for a public hearing to provide for special assessments as prescribed provide for acquiring for additional facilities. The other one request no. 842, is a bill for an act relating to cities of the first class, to change the manner in which special assessments become delinquent.
