LB 146 is already on final reading, 268 if it continues to move along the board will be in the position where E&R will be expected to correlate according to our rules and according to the way we do things in this legislature. The difficulty involved is, that 146 takes everything out of the laws dealing with the death penalty, including procedures for carrying out execution, whereas 268 requires certain of those sections to be left in, so you would be in a hopeless situation, you would have to call back 268 if you did that off of final reading, and bring it back and amend it to put those things back in, which you correlated out, so it's just a matter of saving some time, as you go along, not to correlate, so that's the, this is, we've discussed this with Emery Burnett, the Attorney for E&R and therefore I make the motion.

PRESIDENT: That was a unanimous consent motion?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Well I presume we could ask it that way.

PRESIDENT: And it related to, Senator Luedtke, it relates to 146 and what was the other bill please?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: 268.

PRESIDENT: 268 Thank you. Are there any objections to accepting Senator Luedtke's suggestion regarding the way in which 146 and 268 will be treated? Any objections? Hearing none, it is so ordered and that that will be carried out.

CLERK: I then have another request, I move to unbracket LB 146 on final reading, signed Senator Chambers.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Can that be unanimous consent?

PRESIDENT: To unbracket?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

PRESIDENT: Are there any objections to unbracketing 146 on final reading? Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: What's the purpose of this, dis-associating the two bills?

PRESIDENT: Senator Luedtke, do you care to respond, Senator Carpenter's asking for the purpose of dis-associating the two bills.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: (mike not turned on) are you asking me the question why I move to -

PRESIDENT: I thought Senator Carpenter had the, I'm sorry.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Why Senator Chambers wants to bring up 146.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well the original motion was to put them together and to read Senator Chambers bill ahead of the other one, or vise versa, I don't know what the procedure was, now you made a statement, now Senator Chambers wants to unbracket this and to consider it before we get 268 over there.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Well, my motion is merely that they not be correlated and it won't make much difference, it wouldn't be correlated under any circumstances because, the two, you
