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if they need 10 more men, the Patrol should ask for it. I'm not running the Patrol, I don't know how many men they need and I assume that they have the expertise to know how many people they need and I'm not in favor of A bills coming on the floor for an ongoing program. I think that A bills originally were designed to fund a program that has no funding in the first place, but for us in the Legislature to add 10 more people to the Patrol or 10 more auditors or anything else in the Revenue Department I think is wrong. I don't think we're running the State of Nebraska, I think we're funding it and I'm just in agreement with Senator Keyes that I don't think they'll have to hire them anyway and if they do, they'll probably fire Colonel Kruger. That's the reason that I'm not going to vote to override the veto.

SPEAKER: Senator Moylan.

SENATOR MOYLAN: Mr. President and Members of the Legislature. I rise to oppose this motion to override the Governor's veto. We could spend, they're talking about spending peanuts here. I've never seen any of these peanuts no matter how many you spend, that would ever enforce a law if you didn't have men dedicated to do it. Money will not enforce the law alone. It is essential, of course, to provide the means for enforcing the law, but money alone will not enforce the law and I don't think it we had every man in the State on the Patrol, we would still have problems because that's human nature and I don't believe we need any more men on the Patrol at this time. We have not had a serious request for it. If the men that are on there are allowed to go out and do their job and are being followed up with their arrests and the courts follow up the arrests made by the patrolmen in this line, I think that the drug problem will be taken care of. Now we need, we need more than control of the Patrol to take care of the drug problem and the pushers and everything else. We need some direction to our young people from the home and that's where the trouble is starting. If they would direct the young people. They say they send them away to school and they have to worry what they're going to run into. If they had been raised in the proper home, they wouldn't have to worry about those kids when they went to school. Now I don't think any more men on this Patrol will help the drug situation in the State of Nebraska and I vote against overriding the Governor's veto.

SPEAKER: Senator Simpson.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President and Members of the Legislature. I will override. I'll vote that way. I hope that enough will that we can. One issue that has been partially clarified is the fact of the 6 new investigators that will be put on, very possibly with Federal funds. The important thing is why are they being put on. The intent of putting these 6 people on is not to have 6 drug investigators put on by the Federal Government. They went to the Crime Commission with a special program which allows them to put on 6 people whose primary job is to correlate a report for the Federal Government as to crime in Nebraska. Now, incidentally, along with their chores, they may be able to do a little work in the drug field and in other criminal investigation but this is their primary purpose and the thing that must be done if they're going to receive the Federal funds for these people, so they are not in the drug---. The other issue that I would place before you, when we talked about the drug investigators for the State Patrol and these are really the only people who are getting down to the pushers, the only ones that have the chance and then are cooperating with local people. With these on board, we'll have an average of less than one investigator for every three counties in the State of Nebraska and I don't think we can in any way say that's too many people.
