SENATOR F. LEWIS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I think we have devoted enough time to this. I think, probably, all the questions are answered. I think we ought to vote on it and move forward. I move previous question.

PRESIDENT: Previous question has been moved. Does the chair see five hands? The question is shall the debate now close. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote no. Motion is to...previous...Senator Lewis, Frank Lewis. Senator Frank Lewis has moved the previous question. The question is shall the debate now close. Have you all voted? That particular motion takes 25 votes to bind the body here to close debate. Thank you. The clerk will record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 11 nays, 13 not voting.

PRESIDENT: OK. The debate will now cease. Senator Stahmer, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR STAMMER: Mr. President, I would like to have a division of the question. There are two elements in this Resolution that are not at all incompatible. One asks for a study. The other asks for opposition. I think we either ought to have a study or opposition. I think the both together are in conflict and don't even make sense, so I would request a division of the Resolution.

PRESIDENT: Somebody want to speak to that. OK. I'll divide the question. For purpose of clarification in this particular instance, we are going to divide the question, then. You understand where the question will be divided. All right. The debate will now close. Senator Carpenter, you can close on your motion. Senator Stahmer has asked for a division of the question which the chair has honored. We will take it that way and see what happens.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, first I would like to answer Senator Syas. Senator Goodrich admitted that relatively in Lincoln, he didn't know what he is talking about because he thinks he heard somebody in a conversation which he was not a part of make a statement. In the other area
