Have you all voted? Clerk will record.

CLERK: 9 ayes, 8 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Amendment prevails. Amendment is adopted. Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, I, I think we've taken up entirely too much time and I don't think this was necessary on the floor of the Legislature at all and I regret it because we are filmed by ETV here and this is one thing that we don't need to do out here, but nevertheless, this has gone by and we've wasted plenty of time. I move the adoption of the rule as amended.

SPEAKER: Any further discussion? If not, are you ready for the question? All those in favor of the rule change vote aye. Those opposed vote no. Requires 30 votes. Have you all voted? Chair is going to take the vote. Clerk will record.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 1 nay.

SPEAKER: Motion fails. What's the next order of business, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: I have some reports, Mr. President. (read) Mr. President, a new bill, LB 319A (read) (Notice of committee hearings read) (committee reports read) Unanimous consent asked.

SPEAKER: Any objections. If not, it is so ordered.

CLERK: Mr. President, I ask permission to be excused for the balance of the morning, signed Senator Barnett.

SPEAKER: Any objections? It is so ordered.

CLERK: That's all, Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Senator Syas.

SENATOR SYAS: I ask unanimous consent to be excused Friday and Monday.

SPEAKER: Are there any objections? It is so ordered. Is there anything further on the Clerk's desk?

CLERK: Nothing, Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: I have a point of per--personal privilege.

SPEAKER: State your point.

SENATOR NORE: I, I'm wondering in the area of the ETV, I, I don't like the idea of, of cutting these things up and taking-- now for instance, we make a statement but the preface to the statement is cut out so ther--so our constituents get a whole different idea of the connotation of what we're--of what we say. and I think if they're going, if they're going to put on ETV a certain debate, it all should be said, nothing be cut out and I, I don't like the idea of cutting out these prefaces. After all, you give a preface for the reason for your statement but the reason is cut out so we get misunderstood completely on some of the things we say, in fact the preface is probably more important than the statement and that goes for the newspapers sometimes too.

SPEAKER: Okay, Mr. Clerk, what's the next order of business? Ready to proceed to general file. Senator Carpenter has something he wanted to take up, or has that been established? We'll now go to general file.
