a certain practice, then it's our responsibility to see that that practice is implemented throughout the entire State of Nebraska. That's the only issue we have here, the only reason that there's a difference between this bill and 173 is that there isn't a great political outrage among a vocal and well financed minority to oppose immunizations that there is in fluoridation and that's the basic issue we have here--whether we're going to exercise our proper responsibility in insuring the health and welfare of the people of the State of Nebraska by preserving their teeth through fluoridated water.

PRESIDENT: Well now stand by, we have the motion to indefinitely postpone and we also have a little bit of business here to dispatch and Senator Burbach has, it's possible, wants to carry something with him so let's take up the Burbach resolution here and see what we have on that one. We continue the debate on this motion after we recess.

CLERK: Legislative Resolution 31, introduced by Senator Burbach 9f the 19th district (read).

PRESIDENT: Alright, Chair recognizes Senator Burbach.

SENATOR BURBACH: Mr. President, Members of the Legislature. This is extremely fast. I'm sorry we're interrupting debate of another bill but we must be leaving for the airport in a few moments. In order to have this resolution, if adopted and I'm certain that it will be, have it in the proper form for the presentation as indicated in the resolution, to those people back in Washington, D.C., and I move for the adoption of the resolution.

PRESIDENT: Is there any further discussion of the resolution? It'll take a suspension of the rules in order to adopt this. Senator--well, Senator Kelly? Then Moylan, then Johnson. Okay. Anybody want to speak on the resolution? Senator Johnson, did you want to speak on the resolution? Thank you sir. Question is shall the rules be suspended then and the resolution be adopted? All those in favor will vote aye. All those opposed will vote no. We're voting on the Burbach resolution regarding a rollback on meat prices. Voting on the Burbach resolution, I'm--want to give everybody a chance to vote. Has everybody voted now? Are you all through? Okay the Clerk will record. Alright, Senator Nore voting aye.

CLERK: 37 ayes, no nays, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Very good. The amendment is adopted. Is there any other business to come before the body?

CLERK: Yeah--We need to get that signed, Mr. President. Mr. President (unanimous consent request read)

PRESIDENT: Are there objections? Hearing none it is so ordered, the amendment will be printed. Senator Burbach, did you wish to be heard again?

SENATOR BURBACH: Mr. President and Members of the Legislature. In following up with the resolution, and after discussion from earlier of this morning, Senator Epke, Senator Rasmussen and Senator Kime will be accompanying me to Washington and I ask that all four of us gentlemen be excused.

PRESIDENT: Are there objections to their absence? Hearing none, so ordered. That's an excellent delegation. Senator Proud, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR PROUD: Mr. President, I think we're finished with the debate on this; if we are, can't we take a vote, if these
