SPEAKER: All right then we are taking no further action on 311 and 302 and I presume, Senator, that would include the A-bills? So they will, we'll just pass over those for now and my assistant, Senator Carpenter, has brought me a list of bills that in his judgment are noncontroversial. Since I don't have my own list, I'm going to tentatively accept his unless there is objection to that procedure. Now he has picked out some bills that he feels are noncontroversial and we have put those bills up here on the board under General File starting with LB 320, isn't that right, Vince? Now is there any objection to this procedure because if there is, now is the time to say so. I assume that Senator Carpenter is not trying to--which I know he wouldn't do--slip in some thing here under, that's controversial under a title of non-controversial. Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I don't think I've got a bill in the list.

SPEAKER: Well, that's not the point but...

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, I also assure you I don't have any sleepers there which of course I'm capable of doing from time to time.

SPEAKER: The chair at this time would like to recognize a gentleman sitting under the south balcony, Mr. Bill Barrett from Lexington. He's state chairman of one of the parties. I, since this is nonpartisan I don't like to mention the name of that party but we're glad to have you here, Bill.
