

to build a facility on this and if they are going to do such, why I think that they should have control of the land and not be on a lease type of situation so I, I would hope that the Executive Board, in their wisdom, if they see to go ahead with the proposition, would sell the land outright to the County.

PRESIDENT: Now is there any further discussion of the resolution? Senator Barnett, do you care to close on your resolution? Alright, the first thing we have to do is suspend the rules in order to take it up and take a vote on it so the question is, shall the rules be suspended and the resolution considered? All those in favor will vote aye. All those opposed will no. This is the Barnett resolution regarding the sale of the land. Thank you. The Clerk will record.

CLERK: 31 ayes, no nays.

PRESIDENT: Okay, the rules are suspended. Now the question is, shall the resolution be adopted? All those in favor will vote aye. All those opposed will vote no. You are voting now to adopt the resolution. Have you all voted? Clerk will--record.

CLERK: 31 ayes, no nays.

PRESIDENT: The resolution is adopted.

CLERK: Alright, now, Mr. President, we have another resolution. Legislative Resolution No. 38 (read). Mr. President, the resolution contains thereon all 49 names of the Senators.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Proud, Mr. Speaker.

SENATOR PROUD: Well, Mr. President and Members of the Legislature, I hope you will pay close attention to this because in my judgment and I think in yours, this is an important matter. It is rather frequently that we honor so-called dignitaries in this Legislature. It is not often enough that we honor the people who really do the work around here for us. Miss Griess, as stated in the resolution, started to work for the Legislative Council on November 6, 1943. She was Assistant Researcher for Dr. Roger Shumate and Librarian for one year and she edited the 1954 Blue Book and from then on has
