SENATOR CARPENTER: May I make one statement and then I will stop.

PRESIDENT: Go ahead, Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: May I suggest to Senator Schmit, Senator Goodrich and Senator Carstens, after he gets through talking, will they attempt to bring about an amendment they three can agree upon.

PRESIDENT: Very good. There is really nothing before the body, Senator Goodrich. If you don't mind, I would like to terminate the discussion here someplace along the line. Now, we have a very interesting visitor here today and he is visiting...is Mr. Max Wilson from Melbourne, Australia and Max is the son of Ray Wilson, our Sergeant at Arms. He is General Director of General Motors overseas operations based in Australia. He directs the operations in Japan, Korea, Thailand, South Africa. He recently was awarded an honorary degree of Commerce from the University of Port Elizabeth in South Africa for his contribution to the motor industry in the area. Seems to me like we ought to give a round of applause to our Sergeant at Arms son back there. Thank you, Max. We understand you are about to catch a plane from Australia. We are delighted to have had you here and a chance to introduce you and bon voyage and please come back and visit us again. Great. All right. Now, then, as near as the chair understands it, we are about to debate LB 286, or begin the debate thereof. Trying to find out if we have read the bill. General File of LB 286. The clerk will read the bill. Just the title.

CLERK: Read title. LB 286. There are amendments to the bill, Mr. President. There are Committee amendments. There are subsequent amendments to the Committee amendments. First ones are offered by Senator Stahmer, then there are some amendments to the Stahmer amendment offered by Senator Anderson, if that's clear.

PRESIDENT: The first amendments were Committee amendments. Then they were proposed to be amended by Senator Stahmer and then Senator Anderson has proposed to amend the Stahmer amendments. That's very interesting. Well, let's see if we can thread the eye of the needle here. I think, at least, we should get an explanation of the Committee amendments, then the Stahmer amendments, then the Anderson amendments. Then we will vote on them in inverse order. That appears to be the best way to go. So, who wants to handle the Committee amendments to LB 286. Senator Kennedy, you have the floor.

SENATOR KENNEDY: Mr. Speaker, and fellow members, I feel at this time that the amendments proposed by the Committee on LB 286 are really the bill. If necessary, I would ask that our Clerk read the amendments. If anybody feels that that
