

mean, I don't know. Does it mean a rigid 20 mile speed on the main street of every town? It means a 25 mile speed limit on every residential section. I want to know and by what method can they change it on the local level, if any method.

SENATOR BARNETT: My answer is...the only way I can answer your question is that a 20 mile an hour speed limits means that no vehicle can go over 20 mile an hour. I think that is about as simple as you can get and I would say, also, that in any gove...any municipality, that within a city limits or incorporate limits, they could change their own speed limits to accomplish their own speed laws.

SENATOR CARPENTER: That's what I want you to show this body, and myself, where in this bill it permits them to do that.

SENATOR BARNETT: OK. I'll try to find it. I've been trying to go through it while you have been speaking but I can't find the page.

SENATOR CARPENTER: So, I would move...

SENATOR BARNETT: 67..

SENATOR CARPENTER: OK.

PRESIDENT: Do you want to stand by just a minute, Senator Carpenter? We have some other input from some other people. Senator Skarda, then Senator Mahoney, then Senator Duis.

SENATOR SKARDA: Mr. President, my concern..my concern for this bill I related to you just a few seconds ago, and since then Senator Lewis withdrew his motion to hold the bill because of allowing the amendments to get on but I am going to renew the motion and ask that it be held until February 1st, 1974, boxed and bracketed on Select File because I am afraid we are going to get in an area where there is going to be a lot of controversy develop. You have already heard from one member of the Committee that is dissatisfied with it. You've heard the Senator who has introduced the bill unquestionable in his mind about certain sections of it. So if the bill don't take effect till January of next year, what's wrong with holding it for thirty more days and let everybody have a chance to review it. So, Mr. President, I make that as a motion.

PRESIDENT: Now, I think I caught the motion was to bracket LB 45 on Select File until next February.

SENATOR SKARDA: February 1st, 1974.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. That's the motion before the body at this time. Now, Senator Mahoney, do you want to speak to that motion?

SENATOR MAHONEY: Mr. President, I do want to speak to that motion. I think this bill is similar to another bill that Senator Luedtke has, LB 8. In this...in this relation, Senator Luedtke, it is one that has been back and forth and talked about putting up this particular year. Senator Luedtke, I was trying to explain this to you, just for a second here, and what it would amount to is it will give us time because LB 8 had so much to do with the overall law enforcement and the changing of the laws. I can't see why this Interim Study Committee which just barely had this last summer and there isn't a member on that Committee that could be an expert that we can't all, as Legislators, look over this legislation for another six months and come back because there is a lot of things in here. We don't know what is in this bill. I don't think it is that crucial, that much of an
