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prohibition in the original bill where a Class C license could not sell off-sale. It's my understanding if you go to page 10 on lines 4 and 5 I think that does that. In other words, it puts the law back as it was before the introduction of the bill. On page 10 also it provides that in the case of beer on-sale in a restaurant only a man can have more than two licenses which the prohibition that now exists on everything, this makes the exception on the bill and the purpose is to allow people who sell pizzas and other related things tacos in order to sell beer along with the banjos and all the jiggings.

And it was understood also, Senator, we had an amendment on dispensers. The dispenser was to license those who handled these products with the exception of those who might carry out of a grocery store in order to put it into a purchaser's car. I have told this body that I would contact the Commission if there was still in opposition to it as they were the other day and I'd have an amendment which would strike all the dispensers reference in this bill. Their opposition was as I recall that if they had about 15 or 16,000 employees state wide and they didn't feel they ought to go to that expense even though you paid \$1.00 a piece in order to license them.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. Chairman--Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: There's no, nothing related to a fair trade.

SENATOR CARPENTER: That's the next bill, Senator.

SENATOR NORE: The next bill, okay, thank you.

SENATOR CARPENTER: That is a bill which would give--and I think we can do it legally if you so desire--a mark-up of 15% on the cost of people in this business.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nore, have we answered your questions now? Very good. Senator Epke, we're still debating the bill here as amended.

SENATOR EPKE: Mr. President, I have one question of Senator Carpenter for clarification before we vote on this.

PRESIDENT: Go ahead.

SENATOR EPKE: Now, it is, is my understanding correct that the bottle clubs will be issued a fee license, they will have an off-sale license for beer and liquor both?

SENATOR CARPENTER: No off-sale.

SENATOR EPKE: No off-sale at all, for either one, for beer or liquor either one? Thank you.

SENATOR CARPENTER: ...and they are no longer required to have a membership list. Now the purpose of that is obvious. We're giving the bottle clubs in the minds of the people who oppose the bill an additional privilege they didn't have before and the people who are in the Class C business and off-sale don't want to do anything more than necessary in order to make the thing free and open so that they would lose a lot of their business.

PRESIDENT: Now once again, are you all through discussing the bill? Question is, shall LB 111 as amended copious times
