PRESIDENT: All right, the motion before the body now is to start the roll call vote at the end of the alphabet. Is there need for discussion? Question is, shall you start backwards? All those in favor, will vote aye, all those opposed will vote no. Well, I had to get into the act somehow. Chair would rule what you are going to need 25 votes to do that. To bind the body of that action. Have you all voted? Clerk will record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 17 nays.

PRESIDENT: The motion carries. Senator Stahmer, for what purpose do you rise?
