PRESIDENT: Any further discussion of the committee amendments? Question is, shall the committee amendments be adopted? All those in favor please say aye, those opposed say no. Ayes have it, so ordered. The amendments are adopted. Now.

SENATOR BURBACH: I move to advance LB 530 to E & R for Initial.

PRESIDENT: You've heard the motion to advance the bill. All those in favor of advancing 530 as amended with the committee amendments please vote aye, those opposed--excuse me, Senator Proud, did you wish to be heard on this issue?

SENATOR PROUD: No, I'll pass but I would like the floor in just a moment.

PRESIDENT: All right, thank you. Question is, shall 530 as amended be advanced from General File to E & R for Initial? All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote no. Okay, Clerk will record.

CLERK: 28 ayes, no nays, 21 not voting.

PRESIDENT: Now what's your pleasure regarding 114, gentlemen?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Move we advanced to E & R.

CLERK: 114?

SENATOR CARPENTER: No, I move, there's no committee amendments on this, is there?

PRESIDENT: 114? Clerk will read the title, stand by.

CLERK: Legislative Bill 114, the bill has been read and laid over, Mr. President, it's ready for consideration. The committee amendments were adopted. They have been adopted.

SENATOR BURBACH: The committee amendments have been adopted previously. I move that LB 114 be advanced to E & R for Initial.

PRESIDENT: Senator Proud, do you want to be heard on 114? Any further discussion? Question is shall 114 be advanced from General File to E & R Initial? All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote no. Senator Schmit, better be standing by. We're ready for 261. Have you all voted? Clerk will record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, no nays, 23 not voting, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Bill is advanced. Before we take up Senator Schmit's 261, the chair recognizes Speaker Proud.

SENATOR PROUD: Mr. President, I hate to break in here but I feel I must for just 15 seconds. I have a new bill for introduction. I'll be quick about this. You may or may not want to do this. As a personal matter with me, it is immaterial. I'm in favor of doing it so I'll quickly tell you the circumstances. We have 12 or more dental hygienists who have graduated from school, who have passed their examination to practice dental hygiene, they are employed I understand in the State of Nebraska. They have just found out and I don't know why just now but that the law prohibits them from practicing their profession as dental hygienists until they are 21 years of age. These girls are like 19 years of age and are fully qualified, have taken their required 2 years of college and have passed the examination. Now there is a little question about this but not much. The lawyer who represents the dental hygienists and I've also discussed this with Emory Burnett about the only way we can permit them to
