SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, this is important enough, we can afford to...

SENATOR DICKINSON: I think so, too. I am not sure what the terminology should be, Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Mr. Clerk, may I ask this. If we don't adopt this or do it until tomorrow, the only problem we will create, then, if the Governor wanted to veto it, we couldn't override it. Is that right? If we move it back tomorrow.

SPEAKER: If it does not come in correctly engrossed until tomorrow, we cannot read it until June 1.

SENATOR CARPENTER: We can read it and the only thing we'd do..the Governor..we could not override the Governor's veto and I am sure that he would not veto this kind of a bill.

SPEAKER: Right.

SENATOR CARPENTER: So I move, Mr. President, I with..I ask unanimous consent to withdraw the motion and then to activate you gentlemen, particularly on the farm who have the peculiar problems, of bringing in an amendment which would be all inclusive in order to take care of all the things you'd like to have this bill cover.

SPEAKER: There is nothing before the house now. Did you wish to say anything, Senator Kelly? There is nothing before the house. Did you wish to have the floor, Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY: Mr. President, if it is legal for me to talk to this energy for just one minute.

SPEAKER: You'd have to..you can't talk on the basis of personal privilege and there is nothing before the house and it will come up tomorrow.

SENATOR KELLY: A point of personal privilege.

SPEAKER: You can talk on a personal privilege but not on a pending bill and this is a pending bill.

SENATOR KELLY: The bill that we are talking about has to do with gasoline and engine fuels and I want to talk on a much broader scope of the energy crisis. That we are just right in the airconditioning season now and there is a lot of irrigation that goes on in this state by electricity and by other fuels other than gasoline or motor fuels and I think in our deliberations of this energy crisis that we ought to be broader in our scope to take in all energy sources, rather than just the liquid energy sources that run engines.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Proud.

SENATOR PROUD: Is there an adjournment motion on the desk?

CLERK: Yes, Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Read the motion.

CLERK: Read motion. Signed, Senator Goodrich. I have a motion to amend that, Mr. President, to move to amend to adjourn sine die, signed, Senator Snyder.
