

SENATOR CARPENTER: I move that we dispense of the readings of the Attorney General's report and all the vetos of the Governor. Now I don't want to be discourteous about it to those Gentlemen or this body, but nobody pays any attention to them, so it seems that if we would put a copy of whatever the communication is to each member we could in turn read it and understand it and it might have some influence on how we are going to vote. If somebody has a objection I will not make the motion.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter is asking unanimous consent and is objecting and asking unanimous consent to bypass the reading of the communications from the Governors office. Are there any objections of dismissal of that reading. Senator Syas do you object.

SENATOR SYAS: Before I do any voting on anything that the Governor has in those letters or that Attorney General opinion I want them on my desk so that I can read them.

PRESIDENT: Are there any objections.

SENATOR SYAS: I did....putting them in the Journal. We don't get that for a couple or three days. The show is over.

PRESIDENT: Good point. Lets do this then, as long as there are no objections, then it is so ordered and we will dispense with the reading of them and we will have the Clerk immediately make copies in order to put these on each one of your desks so that you can have them in front of you. Does that take care of the problem? Now, Senator Carpenter back to you.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Now I think in order to comply with Senator Syas outline, a time to read it I think that we ought to consider suspending the rules and reading the bills on Final Reading now in order to give the Senate the opportunity to read the communications during the reading of the bills if that is their desire. Now I realize that is contrary to what other members might want to do and the motions that they have. If they have any objections I hope that they would express it now, because I have no opinion except that I think that this might be realistic.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter has expressed a desire to suspend the rules and read the bills on Final Reading at this time. Which of course would preclude the motions which are on the desk. I want it understood that we do have motions on the desk which the Chair had anticipated taking up at that particular time but it is whatever the body desires. Just so you know what the conditions are. Now Senator Stahmer for what purpose do you rise.

SENATOR STAHMER: I just want to support Senator Carpenter in this if we are going to suspend and not have these things read I think we ought to have a chance to go to Final Reading and be able to look these papers over before we take any vote for or against anything, particularly overrides.

PRESIDENT: Senator Anderson, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR ANDERSON: Mr. President, members of the body, I rise to point a personal privilege.

PRESIDENT: State your point Senator.
