

get tomorrow with Senator Simpson so that my amendments won't interfere with his amendments and we both I think have the same thing in mind what we want to do.

PRESIDENT: Are there any objections in holding the bill over? Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I don't have any objections, I may have. I have an amendment pending there which would do what I think we ought to do, and that is to strike out the language on 4 and 5 and 6 and that would leave it the county board of all counties and strike out the word shall and put in the word may in there. In my county about 50% of the paper is taken up with advertising of the city, county, and the school board. I am getting tired of subsidizing these newspapers in my area to an unnecessary degree. I think that they ought to have the discretion whether they want to do it or whether they don't want to do it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Richendifer.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: Well now Senator Carpenter, this requires it only once a year, or if there is a change in employment. What these amendments will do is to change it to once a year. Now you are quite an advocate of informing the public, so I think that it is our responsibility to see that they are informed at least once a year. There are many people that won't traipse to the court house to look these things up and after all they do pay the salaries.

SENATOR CARPENTER: What does your amendment do?

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: Mine makes it a requirement for once a year that all counties that they publish this only once a year and then if there is a change in salaries or new people hired they print that. But it only makes it once a year.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Are you on 377?

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: Right.

SENATOR CARPENTER: 377 unless I am wrong, well after the close of each annual or regular or special meeting of the board.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: Mr. President, I withdraw my motion to hold this over. I move for the adoption of my amendments to LB377.

PRESIDENT: Well we have Senator Simpson's amendment which is pending here, then we can take yours up. That being the case then we will go back to Senator Simpson's amendment. Is there further discussion of the Simpson amendment? Senator Whitney. Talking now on the Simpson amendment. That is the motion before the house.

SENATOR WHITNEY: May I ask, Mr. President, Senator Simpson a question?

PRESIDENT: Senator Simpson, yield?

SENATOR SIMPSON: Yes.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Now, what your amendment is going to do then is to delete section one and have a substitute section and therefore section one will be deleted.
