PRESIDENT: Senator Goodrich.

SENATOR GOODRICH: The thought I was going to express and Senator Kennedy, you should pay attention to this one. I was going to suggest that we could actually...we have a motion pending to adopt this amendment. Right? So,

PRESIDENT: No, your motion is to return it to Select File.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Okay, whatever status we have right now. We have LB513 on E&R and engrossing. Can we bracket it right here and give us a couple of days to actually go into this and review this with the people you've been talking to and see if we can't arrive at a mutual understanding of how this would affect the industry and then we'd go forward with it. Would you object to bracketing it for say Monday?

PRESIDENT: Senator Kennedy. Do you care to respond?

SENATOR KENNEDY: No, I certainly wouldn't. I apologize to Senator Goodrich that I didn't involve him in this but Doctor Smith came to me yesterday afternoon and we thought we were going to catch it before it got to E&R and engrossing and I should have remembered too that it was handled yesterday morning. But, I think it's a simple bill. The amendment to me is just clarifying the language. If the body so wishes I have no fault of waiting. I understood Doctor Smith to say that Goodrich, Senator Goodrich, was over to his office and visited with him so I thought he was acquainted with it. I apologize again, if it's necessary, I sure--it's not my amendment, it's for the behalf of the people in the State of Nebraska. So, I would have no objection if we can handle it Monday, let's bracket it. I'll leave my request there to have it brought up Monday to, for a specific amendment and we'll see if there's any change in it.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Are there any objections to bracketing LB513 on final E&R? Any objections? Hearing none, so ordered. The bill is so bracketed until Monday. Senator Skarda, would you turn off your light. Thank you, sir. Do we have any other motions on the desk?

CLERK: None, Mr. President. We have a bunch of new bills, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Well, read the bills, read the titles. Excuse me.

CLERK: LB771, introduced by Senator Stull. Read. LB772 read. LB773, read. LB774 read. LB775, LB776, LB777, LB778, LB779, LB780, LB781 and LB782 read. That is all, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Stand by, just a minute. We will begin the General File discussion here of LB396. Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I have an announcement which to some members I think might be quite important.

PRESIDENT: All right. Senator Carpenter has an announcement.

SENATOR CARPENTER: And I got this from the, Mr. Wilson, who is the head of the bill drafting department. And, I asked him to send me a letter on it. He said; "Pursuant to Section 5 of Rule 5 of the Rules of the Legislature, no senator shall introduce a bill after the 10th legislative day (which will be Monday). In order for the bill drafter's office to comply with this rule, all requests for bills should be received prior to 5:00 p.m. Friday, (which is tomorrow)." So senators who may have bills who they are holding for some reasons or ideas ought to realize his request under the rules have to be made to the bill drafter not later than 5:00 o'clock tomorrow.
