

PRESIDENT: Senator Kramer, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR KRAMER: Mr. Chairman, I suppose you would ask for a point of personal privilege. I'd like to ask Senator Carpenter a question after his announcement.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter, do you yield to a question?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Certainly.

SENATOR KRAMER: Senator Cartpenter, maybe this would be the appropriate time to discuss just how we are going to meet tomorrow. I don't know how much work we got to do anyway, and if we do not meet tomorrow, we'll just change the request to have the bills down at the bill drafters office by 5:00 tomorrow, if we do not meet tomorrow we'll just extend the time till Monday perhaps maybe we ought to discuss if or not we're goint to meet tomorrow.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I presume it would move both dates up, for example you would have until Monday to introduce the bills because we are eliminating one legislative day and I presume that would be according to the rules, but I prefer to have the clerk or the chair interpret that, whether that's the correct interpretation or not.

PRESIDENT: If it's ten legislative days and if you delayed the day, it would delay everything a day.

SENATOR KRAMER: Well then, Mr. Chairman, I would like since we're on it to discuss the possibility of adjourning until Monday when we adjourn this noon. At this time, personally I can't see we got a lot of work to do and rather than waste the day when we only have sixty of them, that when we adjourn, we adjourn until Monday when we adjourn today. I'd like to have some discussion on it, if it is proper.

PRESIDENT: Senator Stull, do you care to engage in the discussion about possible adjournment until Monday?

SENATOR STULL: Yes, Mr. Chairman, I was going to raise the same question in that Senator Kramer has raised. It would seem to me that our schedule for tomorrow would be fairly slack, and perhaps we should adjourn today noon until say 10:00 Monday morning. I would so move.

PRESIDENT: The motion is before us --

SENATOR KRAMER: No, it isn't my idea to adjourn at this time but when we do adjourn today it would be until 10:00 Monday. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Senator Stull has sort of placed the motion before us for general discussion here. Senator Snyder did you wish to be heard on the issue? You got the gist of the motion - was that when we adjourn today it would be until 10:00 Monday.

SENATOR SNYDER: Actually Mr. President, I have no disagreement with that Senator Stull in fact I think I would concur with it due to the light agenda that would appear to be that we would have ~~top~~work tomorrow. Just a word of caution, in recalling my days on the E and R, that if we do this, I don't think we can expect to have a full delay that the clerk mentioned in regards to Mr. Roger's message from the bill drafting office. I think that the 5:00 deadline tomorrow afternoon was anticipating probably some work Saturday for his crew with the deluge of bills that annually accompanies the last couple of days for introduction of bills. so I think we might be putting the bill drafting office under a little bit of undue pressure to expect to close at 5:00 Monday afternoon and have all the bills prepared for introduction the following morning and I'm not disagreeing with your motion at all, Senator Stull for not meeting tomorrow and adjourning until Monday. I would concur with that.
