you to make a critical self-analysis of your actions and forward them to me about what you're doing.

SENATOR WARNER: Senator Barnett, I don't believe uses the word critical self-analysis, what the bill language pertains to is how can we have better coordination from various departments that have inspection responsibility in numerous cars running around the state. And, since there are code departments, I guess we could have said each of the departments as such but all of them are responsible to the Governor's office. All we're saying or suggesting is that since there is always an objection to legislation that has been attempted to bring about coordination, you guys sit down and bring in something for the Legislature to look at next session.

SENATOR BARNETT: Well, I think if you want the truth, the Rules and Regulations Committee of which I'm a member under the direction of Senator Duis who I thought was in here but he's since disappeared, we have started to do this. Maybe we're biased, I don't know, but I'm saying that I think we should have somebody that could look at the inspection from an un-biased position. I guess what I'm objecting to is that a person's making a self-analysis of himself. Now, that's what the intent says but maybe the intent is wrong.

SENATOR WARNER: I don't think the bill talks about analyzing departments. It talks back, can you suggest or recommend to the Legislature how the state can coordinate inspection responsibilities better than it now is.

SENATOR BARNETT: Senator Kremer, if I can ask Senator Kremer a question, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kremer, do you yield to a question?

SENATOR BARNETT: Would you say that's right, that this statement of purpose is not right?

SENATOR KREMER: Senator Barnett, I was busy this morning when my secretary came and asked that I write the statement of purpose. I asked to go to Stu Wheeler who serves our committee in official capacity if he would not write the Statement of Intent and perhaps, I'm sure the bill does not use the word critical.

SENATOR BARNETT: Well, I won't speak on it anymore. I just object to the idea that....

SENATOR KREMER: The Statement of Intent is probably improper.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Mr. President, I think we have something more important than what we're talking about. This bill was asked to be introduced by the committee and the committee certainly must have some reason to do it. So far as I'm concerned, speaking only for myself, when a committee desires this Body to do something, it ought to be automatic. We're only doing one thing, getting the bill in the channel discussion and hearings and let that take care of it. I see no harm in it, I may be for it or against it, I don't know, but I moved the previous question. I hope you introduce all three bills and let nature take it's course.

PRESIDENT: Is there any further discussion now of the motion? Senator Kremer's motion is to just introduce the bill. Senator Kremer, back to you then for your motion. Go ahead, sir.

SENATOR KREMER: The second paragraph of the proposed bill has to do not only with the inspection program as pertaining to the various agencies but a number of other states and Nebraska, too, is concerned about this. We keep adding agencies to state
