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terms on various check related charts. Now it is a known fact that people who are in the penitentiary or the penal complex on various check related charges. They are probably there on more than one. In fact on many. This one sheet that Senator DeCamp handed out shows you that people who are there for insufficient fund checks are also there for forgery and for other crimes. There is no doubt about that in fact, if you want to use, you can argue with these facts and statistics any way you want to. You can show on here that everybody on this list that he gave you would be in the penal complex, notwithstanding the action on this bill. Because they were there for other purposes. They were there for other crimes. They were there because they are on second and third offense. Now I'm going to say something else about this particular statistical analysis of Senator DeCamps. He is trying to argue that because there is such a few people there anyway, and the bill we passed a couple years ago is working. You know, I'm certainly going to say it is working because we asked to have it passed and we know it is working. And this bill does nothing to deter us from that particular means that Senator DeCamp is talking about, and he knows it, and he admitted it the other day when we debated this. You can still go to the County Attorney and use the County Attorney's office as a bill collection agency. That's what the bill does. And we can still use that. But we want to do one step further. We want to make sure that the community, the business men, everybody in the community faces up. Face up to their own responsibilities of these people. This isn't going to let them out of jail. This isn't going to release them on a society. This is going to keep them in the community. The very argument that is made on these statistics will show you that thousands of people are not being convicted now for this crime. A few, many 17 or 20 are shown on this list to have gone to the penal complex. Why should a few even be permitted to go there. It is either some people that society wanted to get out of their community. Wanted out of sight out of mind type thing. Now I've got a..you have heard the saying the picture is worth a thousand words, or whatever it is. How many of you remember seeing the first annual report of the Commission on Law Enforcement and Criminal Justice, which was sent out to you. You remember this. Inside on pages 24 and 25 is an interesting picture, and I think this picture tells a great story about this bill, 568. It shows an old movie of convicts in a mess hall, and it says the guy on the left was thrown in the clink for bad checks. He is about to find out about, escape, assault, and murder. The very reason that this individual that Senator DeCamps talked about and said I think he was guilty of some other crimes like burglary of something. Probably he learned it in the penitentiary. Probably learned it in the penitentiary while he was there on a forgery..when was there not related on a charge related to forgery or checks, but maybe on a check charge. So I'm saying that we should not permit this to happen to anyone. Just as I said the last time we debated this. You should not have a law that permits anyone to be sent to the penal complex for writing a \$76 not sufficient fund check. So that's why I would oppose the kill motion.
