

purpose and we should not do away with any of the procedures that would relate to informing the public as to what ah...a.. has occurred. Otherwise, an agency of state could become a land lord having huge holdings which the public has nothing to say about, can make no protest about, because even though the Universities say and a seller would agree on something perhaps there are members of the public who would object to the bargain that was struck, and if they had an opportunity at a public hearing to make there views known some other arrangements could be worked out. So I am opposed to this bill. I'm not going to move right now that it be killed. I'm contemplating that.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Snyder.

SENATOR SNYDER: Mr. President, members of the body, I have a question of a different nature. I don't have a copy of the committee report to LB653 and checking with some of the neighbors in this area, none of us have the committee report. I don't know that if there was any controversy at the committee hearing, I think that we have gone by the rule before that we would like to have committee reports. So if we at least have the Chairman of the Committee make a report to us on this. I'm not objecting or anything....I'm just bringing it to the body's attention.

PRESIDENT: The Chair understands. The Chair would observe that the Clerk did read the committee report and it has been read to the body.

CLERK: That was on the other bill.

PRESIDENT: Excuse me, the Chair is corrected, that was on the other bill, that is correct. Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. Chairman I just called the committee clerk and there was a report that went in with the bill and what happened to it, I don't know.

CLERK: We are trying to find out too. OK, it has been processed they just missed.--I'll be glad to read it Mr. President if that would help any.

SENATOR KREMER: As I recall Mr. Chairman, there was no opposition to the bill at the time that it was discussed and heard in committee. That is all the information that I can give you at this time.

PRESIDENT: Senator Snyder, I think that the Chair would con-strew that your request for information is enough of a request that one Senator has a right to request that something be read and I think that under these circumstances we should read the committee report. We will let the Clerk read the report.

CLERK: Read committee report.

PRESIDENT: Senator Skarda did you want to be heard on the issue?

SENATOR SKARDA: A question of Senator Goodrich, and this is my question. Does this pertain to all phases of public government and I'm talking about city, county, state, whether it be a school system or what, is that true?
