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think the majority of the hunters are this way, I think it is just the very few that we hear about that destroy the property when they go out on these hunts. I do have one reservation about the bill that is going to bother me and I think that possible when Senator Mahoney brings the bill he is talking about in it might be the proper time to consider it. I do not like the idea of the hunting from the road. I have had the coyote hunters themselves tell me that they do not disagree with that portion of it. That is why I can not understand what Senator Rasmussen is saying when he says they have to maintain this hunting from the road. When themselves they admit that they can hunt them from the ditches and from the inside the fence line. I am going to support the bill for the simple reason that I have told these coyote hunters that it was not done intentionally. But I am also going to seriously consider Senator Mahoney's Bill when it comes up to prohibit hunting from the road.

PRESIDENT: Next to speak is Senator Epke, then Simpson.

SENATOR EPKE: Mr. President and fellow members. I am getting a little bit puzzled with the testimony I am beginning to think that this coyote bill is from Lincoln and Omaha problem. For clarification I would like to ask Senator Rasmussen one question. Senator Rasmussen under certain game laws you have to be required to be a certain distance from the homestead to for hunting privileges and firing a gun is that right?

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: That is correct.

SENATOR EPKE: Now that is still in this piece of legislation.

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: It is not in this piece of legislation it is covered in other sections. The change is nothing on that Senator Epke.

SENATOR EPKE: Ok. Now one other question. The reason I ask this is due to a letter from one of my members. I want for clarification. Is there any penalty for trespassing when a place is posted and what is the penalty?

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: There is a penalty. What the penalty is I don't know. But I know there is.

SENATOR EPKE: Then you are going to answer that.

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: I don't know what the fine is.

PRESIDENT: Any response?

SENATOR EPKE: If there is no penalty I suppose it is meaningless I suppose.

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: There is a fine but what it is I don't know. Senator Epke.

PRESIDENT: Senator Schmit do you care to respond?

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature I believe it is up to \$100 fine for trespassing.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. All right Senator Simpson is next and then Schmit, Kime, Nore and Mrphy.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President and members of the Legislature I am not going to try to solve Senator Syas' problem on splitting hairs. But other than this I think that the Senator Epke brought up the question of the people talking that this was an Omaha-Lincoln Bill and I will tell you that it definitely is. People who are furnishing the manpower to take care of the coyote problem primarily live in these areas. I probably have more people in my district concerned with this coyote problem than most of the rural districts in the State. Because these people have a lot of equipment and they do hunt the coyotes. I can't really see the controversy we are getting with this because what do we have before us. In a bill last year that inadvertently nobody deliberately wanted to change this law or at least they did not so state. We are only putting back what has been the law for
