SENATOR STAHMER: Well I said that I said I was in favor of Proud's motion, which I think he offered here to bracket the bill until the Senator Simpson. PRESIDENT: The motion is to bracket 293. Senator Duis

SENATOR DUIS: I beg your pardon, I didn't hear the motion. I heard the thought he might make the motion, so I'm interested in having the motion made, because we're going to have to stop this and I'm going--to call for a point of order because we've been all over the situation here in many ways of having the motion before the house, so I would suggest that Senator Proud make a motion.

PRESIDENT: Thank you Senator Duis. Senator Proud.

SENATOR PROUD: Yes, Mr. President my motion is to bracket because the simple facts of life are that if we take this up tomorrow or if we take it up Monday, or Tuesday of next week. And the sides are not in agreement. We're just going through the whole thing all over again. There are all kinds of bills we bracket and in many instances that's the proper method of doing things because it gives the opposing sides a chance to work it out and it gives the introducer the privilege, which I think he ought to have of taking it up when he feels the desire.

PRESIDENT: Now, the motion is to bracket the bill. Senator Richendifer.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: Mr. President and members of the Legislature. We heard this bill a year ago. Now the two parties all they really agreed to was to disagree. Point of order.

PRESIDENT: The motion before us is just to bracket the bill. Let's talk on that motion.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: I would oppose bracketing the bill. I don't think that we're going to solve anything. Let's bracket the bill. Senator Simpson it's his bill. Work it out with the two parties that are agreed to disagree, and do something with it. Either get rid of it or pass it.

PRESIDENT: Motion to bracket the bill. Now Senator DeCamp for what purpose did you want to be recognized. You are passing. Thank you. Senator Carpenter for what purpose do you rise? All right. Anybody that wants to be heard now on the motion to just bracket the bill. The question, is shall the bill be bracketed. All those in favor say aye, those opposed say no. All right, let's have it. So ordered. The bill is bracketed.
