CLERK: 31 ayes, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The bill is placed on General File.

CLERK: A Reference Committee report referring --LB 1030 through 33 (Signed) Senator Carpenter, Chairman.  
Mr. President by your committee on Miscellaneous Subjects to whom was referred LB 790 instructs me to report the same legislation recommend it be advanced to General File (Signed) Senator Waldron.

PRESIDENT: Thank you.

CLERK: 656 General File as amended. and 757 General File as amended. 757 came from the Public Works Committee and the letter too came from Public Works (Signed) Senator Kremer.

PRESIDENT: Very good. The Chair understands that we have a visitor in the Chamber today that I know you would want to welcome back. Seated in the South Balcony or under the south balcony is former Senator Ken Diers. Senator Diers would you mind stepping out. The Body would like to welcome you back to the Legislature here. There he is. (applause)The Senator is from Gresham, Nebr. We're delighted to have you back to observe the action here of the Nebraska Unicameral Legislature. The place where you once served. O.K. Do we have any other motions on the desk?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I would like to clear...a bring some information to the body. This afternoon before the Education Committee there are four bills relating to district elections and school districts of various classes. I want you to know that three of those four bills can be killed. Only one of them will be dealt with. This in case anybody has any interest in these bills. The bill that is going to be utilized is LB901 and it will be amended to accomplish various other purposes than those intended by the introducer. I'm just saying this so you will know that not all four of these bills will be acted upon, nor spoken to by myself who is now the chief introducer. Only LB 901. Formerly the property of Senator Snyder, presently the sole property of Senator Chambers.

PRESIDENT: Now, Senator Nore for what purpose did you want to be recognized?

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President, I'd like to ask Senator Chambers a question if he would yield.

PRESIDENT: On what subject?

SENATOR NORE: On the election bill that he has.
