PRESIDENT: OK, lets see what happens. You have heard Senator Schmits explanation of the bill to be introduced. All those in favor of the introduction of the bill vote aye, those opposed vote no. Voting on the introduction of the bill as explained by Senator Schmit. Statement of intent he claims is on the way. That motion still takes 30 votes. Thank you. Clerk will record.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 0 nays and 19 not voting.

PRESIDENT: Very good, the bill is introduced. Are there other bills for introduction? Alright, do you want to read the title? Stand by.

CLERK: Read LB1037. Clerk read unanimous consent regarding LB646.

PRESIDENT: Are there objections to printing the amendments in the Journal? Hearing none, so ordered. Senator Kime your amendments will be printed in the Journal. Senator Whitney, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR WHITNEY: Point a personal privilege. I just had handed out some sheets percentage increases by selected annual salary levels. I forgot to put my initials on it and I'm very sorry, but it comes up as an amendment.

PRESIDENT: Ten demerits for that Senator Whitney. OK.

CLERK: Read notice of committee hearings. Read motions regarding LB228-228A.

PRESIDENT: Senator Luedtke, let me ask you the intent of your motion, is it to take them up on Final Reading today or just....

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President, the reason is that these were hold over bills which each required an amendment the A bill requires an amendment to make it conform to the year

1974 fiscal year 74-75, and the other one is an amendment dealing with the mechanics of the manner in which the salaries are to be paid. That is in 228 itself. So we need to bring it back to put this amendment on, just as we have done with almost all of the A bills that were held over.

PRESIDENT: First we need to unbracket it.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: I move we unbracket it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Luedtke is asking unanimous consent to unbracket 228 and 228A before bringing them back to Select File for some amendments. Are there objections to unbracketing those bills which are now sitting on Final Reading? Any objections? Hearing none, so ordered. The bill is unbracketed. Senator Luedtke what is your next motion.

CLERK: Read motion.

PRESIDENT: 228 and 228A, right? 228 first.
