PRESIDENT: Alright any further discussion? Then the question is, shall the four bills be introduced? All those in favor of the introduction of the bills now, say aye, those opposed vote no. You are now voting on the introduction of the four bills explained by Senator Luedtke. Well, Senator Luedtke, what is your pleasure?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: My pleasure is that I'm going to call for a call of the house.

PRESIDENT: Well...do something.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: I need several more votes. This is just for introduction. We have already suspended the rules.

PRESIDENT: Senator Luedtke is asking for the introduction of the bills. Senator Luedtke, needs two more votes for the introduction of the four bills. Thank you, Clerk will record.

CLERK: 31 ayes Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Alright, the bill is introduced, the Clerk will read the title.

CLERK: Read LB1038, LB1039, LB1040, LB1041, LB925A, and LB678.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Barnett for his motion.

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President, I would ask for unanimous consent to have 678 send back to committee. It has an amendment on it which I understand requires a new public hearing and I understand now that the City Council, the Mayor's office and everybody in the city of Lincoln doesn't believe that the bill is needed. We are going to send it back to committee and see what we can do with it there.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett, the Chair is going to rule that you can't do it by unanimous consent, so we are going to take a vote on it, alright?

PRESIDENT: A vote on it, that is right.

SENATOR BARNETT: OK, I move that we do this then.

PRESIDENT: OK, thank you. Is there any further discussion of Senator Barnett's motion then to return 678 to Committee for hearing. All those in favor of returning the bill then will vote, aye, those opposed vote no. Motion is to return 678 to committee for hearing. Another hearing? That motion still requires 25 votes. Thank you. Clerk will record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays.

PRESIDENT: Bill is returned. President Simpson, I mean Senator Simpson, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President, we continually get all kinds of paper on our desk and some of it is very interesting, the only problem is that sometimes I want to talk to the person who put it on my desk and I have two right here now that I have no way of knowing who put them on my desk. Again they have no initial so I can't talk to anybody about them.
