

CLERK: Read LB866

SENATOR ANDERSON: Mr. Chairman, I think that there should be an amendment on this bill, there is nothing filed?

CLERK: On 866?

SENATOR ANDERSON: You don't have an amendment?

CLERK: No, it says no amendments.

SENATOR ANDERSON: There should be an amendment so I ask that that be passed over until we get that straightened out.

PRESIDENT: Did you ask to pass over 866 Senator Anderson?

SENATOR ANDERSON: Yes.

PRESIDENT: OK, we will pass over 866. Senator Goodrich, wishes to pass over 630. That would take us to the next bill 805.

CLERK: Read LB805

PRESIDENT: Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Mr. President, members of the legislature, just very briefly, 805 provides for preservation. In other words when a street, highway or road is determined to be built, a coordinator is outlined for the building for that road then if someone asks for a building permit, that building permit, now this is the amendment, the building permit will not be issued, by an officer responsible for the issuance of the building permit, until after 60 days from the date of the mailing order for the filing of a request for a permit unless it is waived and the condemnation proceedings commence within 60 days. In other words, if someone requires a permit to put a up buildings in a corner he shall not be granted a permit for at least 60 days unless it is waived by the officer in charge so I move for the adoption of the committee amendments.

PRESIDENT: Any discussion of the committee amendments? Those in favor of the committee amendments say aye, those opposed say no. Committee amendments have been adopted. Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: I ask for unanimous consent that the bill be advanced.

PRESIDENT: The motion is to advance LB805 with unanimous consent with the amendment....

SENATOR KREMER: There was by the way Mr. Chairman, no opposition and so I feel that it is not controversial.

PRESIDENT: Are there any objections? I see none. The bill is advanced? Next bill is 796.

CLERK: Read LB796.
