

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: A point of explanation as to what we are doing here.

SENATOR LEWIS: I can relate it to you Senator Cavanaugh. The original intention was to make the delivery of partial cases possible but that again starts affecting the beer industry and would just create problems. I just think that we ought to strike the whole thing. It is my amendment and I would ask to have it taken off the bill.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. Chairman, I want to make my remarks to Senator Goodrich if I'm in order. This isn't in relationship to this, I'll wait.

PRESIDENT: The motion is, to strike the Lewis amendment to a...a..it is on the top of page 861 of your Journal. Those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. It takes 25 votes. Have you all voted? Clerk will record.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 0 nays and 17 not voting.

PRESIDENT: The amendment is adopted. Senator Cavanaugh, do you wish to move the bill?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Do we have any more amendments?

CLERK: None

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Let me say this, the Senator will be over home over the week end. If those people in your area are disturbed about this bill, let me say definitely that I have absolutely no interest in the bill myself personally. I only suggest that you move it to Final Reading and when it gets there if there is going to be the reaction that Senator Goodrich indicates you will certainly hear it by that time. If at that particular time you want to kill the bill, you will certainly not put any bruises on my body, because I don't care. I only do this because I do in my or most liquor legislation then what the industry and the retailers agree he would like to have enacted into law. I have not had a single protest on this bill from any standpoint in its amended form. I just suggest that we move it to final reading and in the meantime contact your dealers and see what they desire and I'm sure that if they are opposed to the bill they will contact you one way or the other. If there is enough opposition to the bill, kill it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President, I guess this is a point of order. Is it proper to ask Senator Goodrich a question or... it is hard to know what to do here on the floor anymore.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett, I was being disturbed up here, what was the question?

SENATOR BARNETT: Would I be in order to ask Senator Goodrich a question?

PRESIDENT: Is it on this bill LB616?
