SENATOR FELLMAN: I move the adoption of the committee amendments as amended.

PRESIDENT: Senator Fellman would you explain the committee amendment, please.

SENATOR FELLMAN: It carries out what I said before relating to the amendments themselves. It spells out the duties, and it is aimed at protecting the present employees of the Sheriff's department, which now includes both law enforcement and corrections people. And allows them, in a sense to maintain their jobs and not get lost in the shuffle. It also expands the merit board to adjust to this new system.

PRESIDENT: Any discussion? If not, we will take a voice vote. Those in favor of the committee amendments, say aye. Those opposed say no. The committee amendments are adopted. Now we get to the bill as a whole. Senator Fellman.

SENATOR FELLMAN: I move the adoption of the bill, in affect have explained it in talking about the amendment. I move the bill be advanced to E & R Initial.

PRESIDENT: Any discussion? The motion is to advance LB782. Those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote nay. Please pay attention to voting. Have you all voted. Clerk will record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The bill is advanced. The next bill. Go ahead and read.

CLERK: Reports read. I have some more, Mr. President, I have a unanimous consent request on General File to bracket 932 and 933 for debate on Monday, March 18, (Signed) Senator Fellman.

PRESIDENT: These are unanimous consent motions. To set to a time certain discussion on 318. Senator Richendifer.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: Mr. Chairman, Senator FELLman isn't here but these two bills are election bills for filing for office of governor and Lt. governor, and both of these bills from the constitutional revision. And I think he wanted to discuss these both at the same time so that it could be determined before the election.

PRESIDENT: Are there any objections to setting 932 and 933 for time certain. Senator Dickinson.

SENATOR DICKINSON: I object if it's going to place these bills ahead of other bills. I think we sort of had a general agreement the other day we were going to take things more or less in order, unless there was some real emergency and reason to advance the bill above the rest of the bills. I think they should take their place in order. If they want to be put together, put the one that's now ahead back with the other one, and they will come together automatically.

PRESIDENT: They are down about ten bills. Did you object, Senator

SENATOR DICKINSON: They are down about 10 bills.

CLERK: The affect will be to delay them, not speed them up.
