SENATOR F. LEWIS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I think that my sentiments would be to re-echo what some people have said and I rise to oppose

the bringing of this bill back and striking the enacting clause. Now when we debated the ADC bills here before there were cries that people go to work. That is our culture, go to work they said and now some of those same people who refuse to put money into programs for the support of children are now have an alternative for them to go to work and suddenly this isn't the alternative. I would suggest to you that this may be one of the ways to break the vicious cycle of those who are recipients, of welfare funds. Many of those would like to break the cycle as well as many of you would like them to break it. Certainly for someone to go to work and one of the first prerequisites is to have adequate care for their children. This is an alternative that we can provide. Now it seems inconsistent to me that some people oppose increasing and providing ADC payments and with the same voice yell against day care centers. I think that this may be the choice of some of you who do not dispose yourselves to welfare to offer an alternative for economic success for those that are disadvantaged. I think that the motion to deject or to return to select file ought to be rejected and the bill be passed.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President, members, I have mixed emotions on this particular piece of legislation. For one reason I think that probably all of you have seen some of Dr. Judges documentary films of these day care centers. They are using cartoon books with policemen with pig's heads on and shoot the policemen and all kinds of unpatrotic material so I'm not going to vote against this but I think that we should supervise what is being taught these children in their tender age. Are they being taught to be unpatrotic? Are they being taught to be athiastic? I think that if you watch some of Dr. Judges documentary films, not so much in Nebraska but in eastern states, they are starting these children out on a course that could end up with this country becoming a socialistic completely 100% nation and we have already had it happen in the colleges, most of these young people coming out of the colleges are extremely liberal to the point of jeopardizing or almost destroying our democracy and that goes for some of our news people. Most of the young journalists coming out are extremely liberal and it is dangerous. Now we are starting them out at a tender age, at 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 years old showing them cartoons with policeman with a pigs head and say shoot the policeman. If you don't believe this I'll get the film and show it to you. So I think that probably the welfare department should have some authority to see what they
