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that I can pretty well tell you that the probability are that some Senator went to the Attorney General or some lawyer and he says give me some amendments on this bill that have a lot of teeth in them, etc. Well the attorney, whoever it may be, the Attorney General or some other attorney, they don't understand everything about the Anti-Trust Law. Anti-Trust Laws are one of the most complicated areas of the law. Absolutely. The government has a special division for Anti-Trust Laws. Large law firms have special divisions for Anti-Trust Law. And lawyers specialize in it. The legal profession itself in general, does not understand Anti-Trust Law, and this is understandable, because this is the day of specialization. So what probably happened? The attorney, whoever was asked for this, and I'm sure that he can correct if I'm wrong, that Senator Carpenter did not go to the statutes and find the law in Illinois and copy it down. He probably went to some lawyer. That lawyer wanting to be impressive, as most lawyers do. Found the Illinois law, and he lifted it right out of there. Except, that even the Illinois law, as harsh as this bill is, the Illinois law had certain exemptions. Exemptions in it. And Senator Carpenter apparently said, we don't want any exemptions. Well at least the State of Illinois had enough sense not to buy this in a package. Because the Legislators in Illinois had no conception of what this bill would do. Now let me read to you and I'll wind this up, a little section of this bill, of this amendment that we adopted so rapidly. This amendment that we adopted on Select File, without anybody really understanding it, says that any citizen, as I read it, can file a law suit, and later on the bill says, I don't know how connected they are, nobody knows, says the violation of this law shall be a felony. This means that anybody, anybody, not the Attorney General, anybody that's disgruntled in any manner, shape or form, whether their cause is just or not, can come into the court, file a law suit and collect damages. If the jury believes what their attorney's tell them. This is a far, far, reaching bill. We're dealing with a lot of money, and one other point that is very interesting. Senator Carpenter said we've got to get at everybody. Then Senator Schmit in attempting to help him, says that this amendment doesn't really mean anything because the railroads are under the Federal law. Now, who is kidding who? These are absolutely different points of view. If the federal government, does in fact control the railroads, then what is Senator Carpenter or anybody else, what worry do they have about this little amendment. Do you see? The whole argument. The whole argument is absolutely ridiculous. And I urge you, so that this Legislature will not look ridiculous to adopt this amendment, and then later on, if there are other amendments. If it needs a closer look we've got plenty of time to do it. So I urge that you return the bill to Select File for this specific amendment.

PRESIDENT: Senator Schmit did you have a question, or something relating to this procedure. He was closing and..

SENATOR SCHMIT: No, I can wait Mr. President until he has the closing on the bill.

PRESIDENT: The question is, shall LB1028 be returned to Select File for specific amendment. All those in favor of returning the bill vote aye, all those opposed vote no. Somebody asking for a Roll Call vote. Thank you. Clear the board. Senator Carpenter has asked for a Roll Call vote.
