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occur. It's unfortunate that Senator DeCamp was not here at the time the bill was debated but I think it has gone through enough. It is very important to a lot of people. And it is not the kind of game, the kind of bill that a game should be played with. I'm not saying Senator DeCamp is playing a game but we have to view something like this from the standpoint of those people it is designed to benefit. I don't think there's anything Senator DeCamp can say against the bill that was not said the other day. In so many words, it was considered to be a socialist, a communist conspiracy. It was a plot to overthrow the government and the society and subvert democracy. I doubt if that's Senator DeCamp's position. It was stated that the state should not go into the business of taking care of and rearing people's children. It was said that mothers should be kept in the home during the early formative stages of the children's lives. I don't think there's too much in addition that Senator DeCamp could offer by way of opposition. I would ask the Legislature to vote against his motion to delay this bill.

PRESIDENT: All right, now, Senator Frank Lewis, I may owe you an apology and if so, the Chair wants to apologize for that. This is a very unusual motion and I'm going to say that in four years I have never handled a motion of this type where you are asking, of course, to be allowed to enter a motion which would reconsider the bill. And at the same time it involves the delay of the passage of the bill over to the Governor's office. Therefore, I would rule that it is debatable and that he now has moved and that the motion is as the Chair understands it now is to delay the movement of LB972 to the Governor's office in order to allow Senator DeCamp under the rules of the Legislature to ask for a reconsideration of the action. And that motion is in order and you may speak to the motion at this time. Senator Frank Lewis.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Thank you, Mr. President. First of all, I would re-echo what's been said. The bill was fully debated. I, too, am sorry that Senator DeCamp was elsewhere when the bill was debated and voted on on the floor. In all deference to Senator DeCamp's eloquence and his great ability with the rhetoric, I don't believe that he would be in a position to change the ultimate outcome of the bill. I think it would be a subsequent waste of time for this Body and I would certainly oppose the delay of the bringing back of this bill.

PRESIDENT: The next to speak is Senator Cavanaugh and then Senator Duis. Point of order. Senator Duis, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, I would have to ask if this motion is being taken up at this time or if the motion has only been made.

PRESIDENT: Clerk will explain.

CLERK: There are two motions. The motion to reconsider our action in final passage has been presented and laid over. He's now moved to have the bill held in its present status until he can dispose of his motion. The problem being that

SENATOR DUIS: If he were to do this, he would have to suspend the rules because according to the rules, a motion to reconsider must be taken up within three legislative days. If he intends to extend it beyond that point, he'd
