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criticized, then we ought to be able to do what we ought to do by earmarking to the point that these departments have to spend it for that specific thing, and nothing else. Now, we get in a conflict with the Governor of the State of Nebraska, which is fine. He complains, and I presume rightfully so, and part of the time right. What do we do? Now in order to do what we ought to do, we ought to have the earmark the funds so we don't give him or anybody else blank checks to do as they please, to use this money without any accountability. And I want these people to come before this body, hat in hand and ask for money. And give us the respect we are entitled to, and to prove what they need, and to earmark, so they can't spend it for anything else. Then we are going somewhere. So I've talked to Senator Marvel and he is having the staff for your Government Acceptance draft the amendments which will be received will be put in program, line 15 and page 4, the amount which suggests about fifty thousand dollars general, and fifty thousand federal, which will be earmarked for the specific purpose of obtaining a plan as outlined previously in this particular section. Because I've been around here long enough to know, unless you earmark it for this specific purpose they will find a reason why you didn't give them enough money to do that because it doesn't do other things. Now I can see where planning is a very important part in the field of education and anything else. The hundred thousand dollars may not be enough. And if it isn't enough they will spend it as far as they can and I presume they will go before the Budget committee and to varify what they spent the money for and how they arrived at the answer they got in whole or part. Then I'd like to talk about, Senator Marvel, have you any thing up..anything to discuss up to where we get into the area of instructional television.

SENATOR MARVEL: I think we have covered everything.

SENATOR CARPENTER: It's getting late today. Can you comply with the staff. On the eight hundred and twelve thousand nine hundred and eighty dollars to break it down into a reasonable analyzation of what they are going to spend it for, and I mean in some details to the extent that this body if it so desires, by a majority vote, can earmark some of it to the point that they know what they are going to spend it for, and not give them a blank check of \$812,000 to spend as they want to. Now I'm presuming that ...and assuming that your committee has plenty information given to you I presume by the staff and by your own committee. Is that true? O.K.

SENATOR MARVEL: Now we are talking about the program on the bottom of page 5, line 25. While we are getting this can we go on to the next.

SENATOR CARPENTER: What I'm trying to suggest Senator, is tomorrow..by tomorrow if you can, do that in the area of the expenditure for television and every other agency in a like manner and give the detail of that so that this body can look at it with some understanding, I presume as the budget must of had to arrive at round figures. And I realize that it will where..a little bit of work, I presume it is only a matter of copying it. But I think, and I'd like to have this body discuss in detail what we're spending this money for, and where it might appear that we ought to consider to earmark, we do earmark to be sure that it carries out the function and the desire and the
