SENATOR MAHONEY: I'd just like to speak to this that this LB870 was a bill last week before we went home on that Wednesday and the days are getting counted out. I just hope that we would reach this thing right after Final Reading because this is the last particular day that I would be interested it back in the hopper.

PRESIDENT: There was earlier discussion this morning that that would be one of the points we would consider today if there were any motions to run out. The point is well made here. Now, does the Clerk have some sort of indication of the amount of Final Reading we might have if we were to take up tomorrow. Does it look...does it look...it's difficult to predict but the Clerk doesn't think we have. At least we don't have any more 234 page bills in the pile. Now, Senator Dickinson, for what purpose do you rise? We're discussing only the motion which is to suspend the rules to take up tomorrow's Final Reading today. Go ahead, sir.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Question of the Chair?

PRESIDENT: Go ahead, sir.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Well, does this mean we're going right back to Final Reading and not go through some motions that might be on the desk?

PRESIDENT: Right now, you go right...right, you move right on to Final Reading.

SENATOR DICKINSON: I object, there's a motion on the desk that I want to take of on LB821. I think we ought to.... pardon?

PRESIDENT: We're going to....we think we're going to get to those other motions here.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Well, we think, we think, why don't we take things in proper sequence?

PRESIDENT: Well, you are taking.....

SENATOR DICKINSON: I object, I object to the motion.

PRESIDENT: Well fine. Go ahead, sir. Now, Senator Duis. Wait a minute. Senator Cavanaugh. Do you want to get in the issue here? Motion is to suspend the rules and take up tomorrow's Final Reading today. That's all that's before the house.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Well, can Vince tell us, would it take an hour? Are we talking about an hour? We can do it in an hour, Final Reading?

PRESIDENT: We think so.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Okay.

PRESIDENT: Now, Senator Cal Carsten, do you want to be heard again? Senator Chambers? Are you all through discussing the issue? Question is, Senator Carpenter, I understand you're anxious to consider the question but I have lights on and people are asking to speak and I can't
