PRESIDENT: Are you ready for the question. All those in favor of suspension of the rules. Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: That's on this raising..put on General File.

PRESIDENT: Yes, directly below the Appropriation Bill. This is a Claims Bill.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, we have just about enough time between now and when we recess, why don't we put it ahead of General File and take care of it. I would presume it is not controversial.

PRESIDENT: Senator Maresh, is it controversial?

SENATOR MARESH: No, some items are but the report isn't in the book. So that's why I placed it on Wednesday's

PRESIDENT: Well, if there is any part of it controversial, we will take it the way we had it. All those in favor of suspending the rules and placing this bill directly below those of the Appropriations vote by signifying by saying aye. I beg your pardon we are going to have to do with 30 votes. Let's go. Clerk please record the vote.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Motion is carried.

CLERK: Mr. President, we will insert in the Journal a corrected Committee report to LB819. (Signed) Senator Chambers, Chairman of the Government Committee. I move to suspend the rules and kill bills after LB677 on General File (Signed) Senator Carpenter.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Now obviously we are not going to get to these bills. We are wasting a lot of chalk and a lot of the Clerk's time remarking this board every day. Now if you want to get out of here. Let's lighten the load and let's kill all the bills that are not now underlined. I move the question. Senator Carpenter.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter, I think that we should not move the question immediately. Senator Fellman.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Mr. President and members of the Legislature. Thereare I think still one or two members of this body that have not underlined a bill, and I know of some activity at least relating to one bill where there could be some possibilities of substituting and changing. And until I see if the risk of having some Clerk spending a little extra time, which I'm sympathetic I think we should leave these bills there to allow substitutions freedom and the opportunity to get what a particular member wants passed. Therefore, I would oppose my good friend Senator Carpenter on this measure.

PRESIDENT: I'm going to let one or two more speak and please make it brief. Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: How would this apply to bracketed bills? In other words bills bracketed for a particular day, that somebody didn't underline because they assumed that they were going to come up on
