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to have to proceed with some caution here because there is some constitutional requirement involved in this particular matter. No, I don't object to moving them all at once. But I don't see how you can move them until you have complied with the requirements that the bills be read, at least the titles are read on General File. So let's go back and read the titles to the bills, then the motion is in order and it can be taken up, and I don't think that we have a problem. I don't want a fly in the face of the constitution, and the Clerk has a very valid point it seems to me. Now, Senator Stull. SENATOR Stull.

SENATOR STULL: Mr. President, would it be proper to see if we could suspend the rules first.

PRESIDENT: Sure.

SENATOR STULL: I think that if we don't get it, there is no point in going any further.

PRESIDENT: If we don't suspend the rules in order to advance the bills that way. It..would..that would...we don't have an issue at all. Now, Senator Duis for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR DUIS: Might I make a suggestion.

PRESIDENT: I would suggest.... Yes.

SENATOR DUIS: I would suggest that the bills be read first, one at a time. And then they be advanced after they are read and I think your suspension of the rules should come after they have been read.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, I would proceed in that order. Now, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, if the bill on the Judge's salary, which is 923, I know one vote can't stop it, is not included among that number that is advanced in this fashion I'm going to vote against the suspension of the rules.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers you are suggesting that that bill has to be included in this motion? 923. Senator Fellman, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR FELLMAN: The question before the house now?

PRESIDENT: Well, right now we are going to go back and we are going to read the titles to the bills.

SENATOR FELLMAN: The bills that are underlined?

PRESIDENT: No. To the bills that have been offered in this amendment to suspend the rules. We are going to read the titles to those, and then we will vote to suspend the rules, and advance all of those bills at one time under one motion.

SENATOR FELLMAN: What did Senator Chambers, inquiry relate to?

PRESIDENT: His related to the judges bill, and that he wanted that included in the motion. And Senator Stulls, the Chair's
