

PRESIDENT: Senator Johnson voting aye.

CLERK: Senator Johnson voting aye.

PRESIDENT: Senator Burbach voting aye.

CLERK: Senator Burbach voting aye. Senator Cal Carsten voting aye.

PRESIDENT: Senator Cal Carsten voting aye. Senator Stahmer. Senator Schmit voting aye.

PRESIDENT: The motion's adopted. Any further amendments, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: One more, Mr. President. Next amendment is adopted by Senator Keyes.

PRESIDENT: You mean proposed by Senator Keyes?

CLERK: Proposed by Senator Keyes, yes. (Clerk read amendment, found on pages 1456-57 of Journal).

PRESIDENT: Senator Keyes. What does that mean?

CLERK: Well, it's rather lengthy....if he wants me to read it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Keyes, explain the amendment.

SENATOR KEYES: Yes, I'd like to have it read.

CLERK: You want it read?

SENATOR KEYES: Yes, I do.
