SENATOR MARESH: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature. I wonder if Senator Simpson would yield to a question?

PRESIDENT: Senator Simpson?

SENATOR SIMPSON: Sure.

SENATOR MARESH: Senator Simpson, is there any provision for...say if there's a new north and south interstate comes through the rural area, there's no provision to allow some credit for lack of population is there?

SENATOR SIMPSON: Under this, if they were a new interstate coming along and if they were building accommodations along with it, they would be allowed under this bill to get licenses.

SENATOR MARESH: Where is that spelled out?

SENATOR SIMPSON: Talking about they can get a license in connection with the operation of a hotel.

SENATOR MARESH: It would have to be a motel to get or be allowed to have a license, right?

SENATOR SIMPSON: Oh yes.

SENATOR MARESH: No other.....

SENATOR SIMPSON: Well, to go around the provisions of the bill it would, yes sir.

SENATOR MARESH: A eating place couldn't have one then, right?

SENATOR SIMPSON: Not unless it's in the hotel.

SENATOR MARESH: I see, thank you.

PRESIDENT: We are now considering the Simpson amendment. The time has run out. The debate has ceased. Senator DeCamp has a motion pending for indefinite postponement but we will first vote on the Simpson amendment. All those in favor of the Simpson amendment vote aye. Those opposed vote no. This requires 25 votes. If you're going to vote, please vote. Otherwise, Senator Simpson will call for a Call of the House. Clerk will record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays.

PRESIDENT: Amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Motion on the desk. I move to indefinitely postpone LB759, signed, Senator DeCamp.

PRESIDENT: There is no motion on this...no debate on this motion because the time is expired. All those in favor of indefinitely postpone the bill vote aye, those opposed vote no. Motion is to indefinitely postpone. LB759, Senator Simpson. Motion is to indefinitely postpone. Have you all voted? Senator Simpson.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President, I think I'd be willing to give them a chance to vote on it. I ask for a Call of the House.
