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attorney \$30,000. So how does it figure out? Whose supposed to be making the money? I think that conscientious county attorneys, and we have one here, are doing the work of the job and anything they would do outside would not be to the detriment of their office. The type of work they would do would be court cases and so I think that we should kill the bill and leave Lancaster County alone.

PRESIDENT: Senator F. Lewis.

SENATOR FRANK LEWIS: No response.

PRESIDENT: Let's see if we can hold the noise and confusion down just a little bit. Senator Frank Lewis has the floor.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: First of all, Mr. President, I would make just a couple of comments. Senator Snyder, as a little former teacher in drama, I give you probably a B plus for that performance. Also you could be arrested for impersonating a former office if you're not careful. I'd like to say a couple of things and then I'd like to direct a couple of questions to my good friend, Senator Cavanaugh, who has developed an interest in my county for which I'm appreciative. First of all, the first question I would have is the question that I think Senator Simpson touched upon which concerns me somewhat and that is if the overwhelming concern of this Body is the practice by the county attorney, what is the difference between the county attorney practicing in outside practice and the chief deputy practicing in outside practice?

PRESIDENT: Senator Cavanaugh, do you care to respond?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I wasn't listening.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: That's typical. I'll re-phrase that and take up some more of our time. Senator Cavanaugh says we give a lot of political speeches here but sometimes it because of listening that we waste a little time. To repeat the question, what is the difference between a county attorney not being allowed to practice full time outside and the chief deputy being allowed to practice full time outside as provided by the provisions of this bill?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I don't know if the bill says anything about chief deputies. I would assume that it would be up to the county attorney to set the terms under which his deputy or deputies would serve.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: You think he has that power?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Sure.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Now, I'm not really astute on law like perhaps you are but I thought that if the law was silent, then that certainly allowed them to follow the course they wish to follow.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Well, they become employees of the county attorney and I would assume that he would set the same criteria for them as he has himself.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Now, Sarpy County has four, I believe it's four assistant county attorneys. Is that right, Orville?
