SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I just wanted everybody to know what they were in favor of introducing.

SENATOR MURPHY: Thank you, Senator Cavanaugh.

SPEAKER: The motion is shall the bill be introduced by the Committee. It will take 30 votes.

CLERK: Speaker voting aye.

SPEAKER: Have you all voted? --do you arise, Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: For the house, sir. Happily that's not necessary and thank you.

SPEAKER: Have you all voted? The clerk will record.

CLERK: 32 ayes, Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Would the clerk read the title at this time?

CLERK: Yes. LB 528. Title read. Mr. President, I have a Resolution. LR #6. Introduced by Senator Mahoney. Read. See Page 271 and 272, Legislative Journal.

SPEAKER: The Resolution will lay over a day and be referred to the Executive Board.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have a motion on the desk.

SPEAKER: Proceed, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, (Motion read--See Page 272, Legislative Journal). Signed Senator Cavanaugh.

SPEAKER: Senator Cavanaugh. The chair recognizes Senator Cavanaugh.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: The motion speaks for itself unless there are any questions.

SPEAKER: Senator Warner, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR WARNER: For clarification of the motion, Senator Cavanaugh. I would assume that this would automatically be done in any event. I didn't quite catch the first part. You want all--everything that has been presented presented to each member of the Legislature, a copy of each thing, and then would this include like a copy of all ballots. Are you also saying that or are you saying those papers that were filed otherwise. Obviously, the Committee records are the property of the Legislature as a whole and would be filed accordingly.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I wasn't familiar with whether--I wasn't familiar with how the Committee was approaching this. The Committee made its report yesterday and the items handed out to us, it was my understanding that that was the report of the Committee in its entirety. I think the entire record should be presented to this Legislature and then the entire record should go on and become the permanent record of this Legislature so that when these deliberations are completed, that everything that was done is set out in a coherent manner. What I'm trying to do is bring up everything from the Committee to include it now in the deliberations of the Legislature so that at the end we have one complete package of this entire transaction.
